


## INSPEC now on Engineering Village 2

The INSPEC database can now be found on Engineering Village alongside Compendex. The advantage is that there is only one search interface to deal with, you can now search both simultaneously and you can also remove any duplicate records that are found on both databases.

For almost any search in technology areas

(particularly computing, maths and engineering) these two databases combined should be a tremendous asset in finding journal articles and conference proceedings.

The Science Faculty too, however, may find there are particular subject areas



## Extra funds

You may be aware of the extra £300,000 that the Library has been



given to spend on books and journals to help counteract some of the above-inflation price rises we've been experiencing—particularly on journals and databases.

Department/Faculty budgets have been increased accordingly and you should get in touch with your faculty Librarian or your Library Liaison Officer about the possibilities which this may present for new books in your subject area.

Very approximately there is an extra £25,000 in the Technology Faculty budget over last year and the same again for the Science Faculty budget.
