- As someone who always uses the library resources from a distance, as we are on a satellite site, I would like to see much better access via Athens passwords through to more health and scientific based journals. We still seem to face some difficulties with remote access, despite use of the password.
- The Site Map used to be very useful and has now degraded; many journal articles are now available via Business Elite (weak search engine, though) JSTOR etc. Can this be integrated into the list of economics journals, or at least links provided? A deficiency of the subject classification is that some material important to the subject is available in areas one does not know: e.g. for Economics under Business; for both under General; and for Mathematics and Mathematical Statistics in Economics, in other subject areas. I feel also that journal cancellation decisions need information on any online availability to be provided. On the whole, very well done, though in terms of organisation and appearance I dislike the last revision of the site.
- functionality of reading lists software and local inputing and speed of uplaoding are cirical factors in usurping current ICJS provision of reading lists
- I am very supportive of a move towards the electronification of all bibliographic resources, provided that they can be remotely accessed on-line not only from the University intranet but via the Web in general.
- using the electronic sources page is counter intuitive. I have watched more than 40 students arrive at this page by clicking links on the left, and not know what to do . http://www.libr.port.ac.uk/ROADS/subject-listing/computing_info_science.html About half of the students found thetop menu and about half needed to be shown. This was done in tutorials so I was there to show them the top menu, but this will not be available to people using the site on their own
- The most useful resource for me is Web of Knowledge which I use regularly and which I encourage students to use.
- Printed materials will always be needed to supplement and tangibilise learning resources for students doing an offline (in person) course, even online courses require access too
- re: question 18. i am fully in favour of replacing costly journal subscriptions with what may be cheaper (?) electronic methods whever possible to increase the library's coverage. however I would not like to see 'books' in electronic form apart from anything else I'm guessing this would pass on even more cost to students in terms of printing etc.?
- Sorry if my contributio looks a bit lame. I run a urology research team: a lot of the stuff we need is a bit way-out for The Library, but we can access it through the hospitals set-up or directly from search facilities like Pubmed. However I am most strongly in favoutr of being able to do this more effectively for example if the Nature Publishing Group;'s output was available full tect on-line, that would be

great. I know they want an exhorbitant fee - but buying in the journals must cost a lot - for a large amount of paper that is redundant as well as a small fraction that gets read.

- would like to be able to order ILLs online
- I'm suprised there were no questions about increasing e-journals. I would like to see more journals available as e-journals, even if this means dropping some paper subscriptions in order to pay for it. At present very few journals in my discipline are available electronically or as hardcopy, making it difficult to do my research.
- Glad you've done this questionnaire. i find the electronic resources a useful complement to the physical ones, but would strongly oppose them being used as a substitute. A lot of awareness comes from browsing, which can only be done physically. Electronic journals, for example, are extremely poor at facilitating this (quite apart from the issue of tying one to a computer terminal).
- RE: Organising of resources electronically. I tend to get the students to use Ebsco etc, as the unit that I teach (Educational COmputing covers both Computing and Social Science. I use the personally quite a lot, however, the 'Once a week'/ 'once or twice a month' well, it's more a case of several times a day in some weeks, then not all for 6 weeks or so ...
- Electronic resources are becoming increasingly important but we need to protect and update the physical holdings
- with regard to electronic only journals,I would very strongly prefer that the library retains hard copies of the journals most heavily used.
- In the 5 years I have worked at the university I have made an actual visit to the library on 4 occassions your services (i.e. copying articles, interlibrary loans) an electronic resources mean that I have not had to visit the library very often. I find this a very effective strategy in terms of use of time and would never visit the library to browse.
- a library to me needs books as well as e copies. I feel that e-copies must never rule out hard copies of reading in my view. It is extremely unsound to read on screen only and damages eyes and backs and much much more.
